THE ITALY ROME TEMPLE

Introduction

The Rome Italy temple is the 162nd operating temple of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints worldwide and the first in Italy. Rome is considered by Latter-day Saints and other Christian faiths as an historic location, a biblical city where ancient Apostles such as Peter and Paul preached the gospel of Jesus Christ. At the time of dedication of the Rome temple, there were 12 other temples in Europe. It serves tens of thousands of Church members living in Italy and in neighboring countries. The Rome Italy Temple is part of a 15-acre religious and cultural center that includes a multifunctional meetinghouse, a visitors' center, a family history center and housing for temple patrons.

President Thomas S. Monson announced the temple during the October 2008 general conference and then presided over its groundbreaking on October 23, 2010. On March 25, 2017, the gold-plated angel Moroni statue was placed atop the taller, eastern tower of the twin-spired building.

"Anywhere a temple is announced and constructed and dedicated and blesses the people, it brings a power to that place. It is the power of the ordinances, the power of the covenants, the power of the light that emanates from the temple, and that blessing occurs everywhere. In our holy temples, available are the most sacred and important sacrament or ordinances that we receive as members of our Church, and those ordinances bring peace. They bring purpose. They are a source of remarkable joy.

"All temples are significant because a temple is a point of intersection between the earth and heaven. A temple is the house of the Lord. It is His house where we learn about Him, and we worship Him.

"Latter-day Saint temples differ from churches where members meet for Sunday worship services. Temples are considered 'houses of the Lord' where the teachings of Jesus Christ are reaffirmed through marriage, baptism and other ceremonies that unite families for eternity." Elder David A Bednar of the Quorum of the Twelve Apostles.

Italy Mission History

In 1849 the prophet Brigham Young called Lorenzo Snow and Giuseppe Taranto, a native of Sicily, to preach the gospel in Italy. They found success among Protestants in Piemonte. Taranto later had success among family and friends in his native Sicily. Most early converts over the next half-decade eventually emigrated to the United States and the Salt Lake Valley. Meanwhile, challenges and persecutions resulted in a halting of Church activity in Italy until the 1960s, when missionary work returned, and a first-of-the-era congregation was organized in Brescia.

In November 1966, Elder Ezra Taft Benson rededicated Italy for missionary work. In his dedicatory prayer, he was inspired to say that thousands of Italians would be 'brought into the truth and into membership in Thy great church.'

In 1980, the first Church meetinghouse in Italy was completed in Pisa. In 1981 the Milan Stake was created and led by local Church members. Today Latter-day Saint congregations in Italy are scattered throughout all of Italy. As the Church has grown, it has received more recognition and respect. In 2012, with President Giorgio Napolitano's signing, The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints obtained full official recognition in Italy.

Construction

The 15-acre (6 hectare) parcel previously was a farm that the Church purchased in 1997, with the property including a villa, a small olive orchard, and an outside pizza oven. For a period, full-time missionaries resided at the villa, and the property occasionally served as a gathering place for members and their activities.

Some of the farm's olive trees were preserved and join other olive trees from northern Italy in being replanted in the grounds' Italian-style piazza, or square. "I used to come here as a youth, and we used to organize small soccer games," said Stephano Mosco, a local Latter-day Saint. "And there was a stone oven where we used to cook pizzas."

Initially, only a small portion of the property was available for temple construction; however, subsequent rezoning allowed the Church to expand to use all 15 acres (6 hectares) for its grounds and accompanying facilities.

Located at Via de Settebagni 376 in northeast Rome near the village of La Cinquina Bufalotta, the temple sits on an elevated

15-acre (6 hectare) parcel just off the A90 Grande Raccordo Anulare beltway—also known as "Il Raccordo" ("The Junction")—that surrounds the city.





Construction began on the three-story, 40,000-square-foot (3,716 square meter) temple on October 23, 2010, two years after the Rome Italy Temple was announced by Church President Thomas S. Monson. He and local Church and community leaders participated in the groundbreaking ceremony.

"It's difficult to explain my feeling," expressed Christian Bruno, a former Latter-day Saint missionary. "The Spirit was all around us. It was a great day for me, for my family and for all the Saints in Italy."

Visitors to the Rome Italy Temple will see the uniquely oval building. The architect for the Rome Italy Temple, Niels Valentiner, shared insights with the Church News about this oval shape and the difficulties building a structure that was a perfect oval. "We kept coming back to this oval design, which is really seen by many as an expression of Italian Baroque architecture," he said. "It takes from Italy an architectural statement and brings it into the temple." Valentiner said the difficulty makes it likely the Rome temple will be one of a kind. "It was not easy," he said. "It probably will never be done again. It is complicated to build. But I think the beauty of the temple is being appreciated and recognized. They will find a temple that combines contemporary Italian architecture with the local past."

Elder Larry Y. Wilson, executive director of the Temple Department added, "If you want to try a difficult construction project, build something the shape of an oval. . . . Many of these interior walls are the shape of an oval.



That piece of furniture looks like it's sitting flat against the wall, but if you go look at it carefully, it is custom made in the shape of the wall, so it's actually curved on the back of it to fit against the curved wall."

The shape of the oval is found throughout the Rome temple. An oval has no beginning and no end and is a symbol of eternity. This is especially appropriate in Rome, which is known as the 'eternal city.'

In addition to the oval theme, the structure of the entire temple complex, including a fountain of water that flows from the temple toward a statue of Christ—the Living Water - holds deep symbolic meaning.

On March 25, 2017, the gold-plated angel Moroni statue was placed atop the taller, eastern tower of the twin-spired building. A crane was used to hoist the statue more than 150 feet in the air before setting it in place. It is gilded with 22-karat gold leaf, and workers only touch it with gloves to avoid marking the delicate surface.

This 13-foot statue of an ancient Book of Mormon prophet symbolizes the spreading of the gospel of Jesus Christ.

Those invited to the raising of the statue of Moroni were 10 Stake Presidents and their wives from all over Italy, the 4 current Bishops of Rome and the media.

Speaking about the construction of temples, Elder Bednar said that everything from the artwork and architecture to the landscaping on the temple grounds is carefully designed.

"Nothing is done by accident," he said. "Everything in the temple glorifies Him whose house it is. All we do and see in the temple bears witness of Jesus Christ as our Savior and Redeemer—the Son of God."



"This had to be one that when you walked onto this site, every person should feel like they were on an Italian site," said architect Neils Valentiner. "They would recognize it because of the materials, because of the design, and because of the surrounding." The temple's design was inspired by San Carlino, a Roman Catholic church in Rome. "The curved ceilings, the curved walls, the expression of the colonnades and columns." And that started this very early concept of a curved church, a curved temple and temple building both on the exterior as well as on the interior."

Reminders of and references to Jesus Christ are found throughout the new temple complex in Rome.



Piazza

In addition to the temple, the grounds include a multifunctional meetinghouse, a visitors' center, and temple patron housing. Linking the various buildings is the piazza constructed from Italian travertine tiles, pavers, and blocks. Walkways surrounding the temple are constructed of Travertine and Porfido pavers.

The Church salvaged 110-year-old Basalt cobblestones from the streets of Rome for the temple roundabout. The artisans who laid the stone were from a family which had worked this craft for seven generations. If you look closely at some of these stones, you can see the grooves worn by the passage of old wagon wheels.

The fence surrounding the temple site on three sides is constructed from plastered concrete stone pilasters and custom wrought iron fencing. The design of the fences correlates with railings inside the temple and incorporates an oval motif design, a recurring theme in both the interior and exterior finishes of the temple.

"The way the square is built reminds me of an ancient Roman forum," said President Cordani from Piacenza. "This is not just an American church planting a flag here in Rome. This feels Italian. It is the perfect blend of excellence and culture. It was built with consideration and love for the people of Italy to help us feel it's ours now." President Cordani's sensation was exactly what the architect had in mind. Niels Valentiner came to the project with a clear concept in mind for the vast site, which, at 15 acres (6 hectares), is 50 percent larger than Temple Square in Salt Lake City.

"We knew we wanted to connect the temple to Italy, and one of the most important things that was very clear in the beginning was that we really wanted to make sure that we created the concept of an Italian piazza," said Valentiner, president of VCBO Architecture.



A piazza — the Italian word means square or courtyard — is typically surrounded by buildings and includes fountains, gardens and/or trees. "We had the four buildings," Valentiner said. "They made it so obvious that we could create a piazza that [was] very Italian. We knew that was an important feature for us if we were going to create what we think of now as the Rome Temple Square. "We have Salt Lake Temple Square. Now maybe we have Rome Temple Square."



The square sits on the site of an old farm that was covered in olive trees and Roman umbrella pines. The pines were protected, and they remain where they were, flanking the temple on both sides. 32 of the original olive trees, which were relocated to various areas on the grounds are thought to be up to 150 years old. These olive trees have been transplanted around the site strategically. Though not original to the site, the four main olive trees planted in the piazza were purchased in northern Italy and range in age from 400-500 years old, as symbolic accents in the piazza.

"There's tremendous symbolism in olives and in olive trees," said Elder Bednar in a Newsroom report, noting the depth reached by the tree roots. "Whenever you cut the roots of an olive tree, they'll sprout. They do not die; they will continue to sprout. Some have suggested that perhaps that's symbolic of the hope of the Resurrection."





A fountain flows down the steps that cover a slight incline from the temple down to the visitors' center on the opposite end of the piazza.

The fact that the water flows from the House of the Lord to the Christus statue was a striking symbol of the living water of Jesus Christ to Susanne Torgard, who is the curator of the Church of Our Lady Museum in Copenhagen, Denmark — the church home to the original Christus statue.

"We talked about the water going directly between the symbol and the Source," she said after a tour of the temple and visitors center and its statues. "The water flows from the temple because it's higher here, but it goes to the Source (Jesus Christ) and there is this kind of a circular movement between them."

The main fountain cascades down into four additional pools and is constructed from Travertine stone with bronze grating. Additionally, the grounds feature a reflecting pond near the temple with a flowing stream leading to the Visitors Center, where the statue of the Christus is located.

"With the fountains, the structures and the greenery, this is a magnificent place people

will flow to," President Cordani predicted. "I can imagine spending hours here with friends."

Temple Exterior



The cornerstone of the Rome temple, dedicated on March 10-12, 2019, is shown in the foreground with the piazza and patron housing in the background, the Visitor Center on the right, and the reflecting pond in the center.

The temple exterior is made of Bianco Sardo Italian granite, with artistic stained-glass windows throughout. Design elements, including the bronze entrance doors with art glass panels, reflect the beauty of Italy.





Temple Interior

Great care was taken in selecting and sourcing materials for the temple to ensure high quality. Design elements reflect the beauty of Italy and the local area.

The temple's predominant colors inside are warm earth tones, blues, bronzes, and gold throughout. Materials include Perlato Svevo stone flooring quarried in northern Tuscany; Cenia marble from Spain; Sapele, burl, and cherry wood millwork; and Murano glass fixtures from Venice.

The grand staircase in the temple's lobby is considered an engineering feat, said project supervisor Bret Woods. "It's connected just at the top and the bottom, so it's essentially a free-floating staircase—and of course, an elliptical shape," he said.


The staircase's oval design suggests the Michelangelo-designed Piazza del Campidoglio and its ramped staircase on Rome's Capitoline Hill.






Original paintings hang in all areas of the temple, reminding temple guests of Jesus Christ and His teachings to follow Him. A picture in the baptistry depicts the Savior's baptism by John the Baptist. The baptistry has an elliptical font with inlaid stones and Roman-style acanthus leaves. Constructed of custom bronze and glass, the railing surrounding the baptismal font incorporates the oval motif used throughout other areas in the temple.

The baptistry's purpose is in keeping with the Savior's example to enter the waters of baptism and His commandment







Other interior features include the instruction room, where Church members learn about God's love, the creation, and the purpose of life. Here, a mural reveals a magnificent setting depicting Italy's landscape ranging from the hills to the sea.



The celestial room has an exquisite chandelier containing thousands of crystal prisms which serves as the centerpiece of the room, a space that represents the progression of reaching heaven. The celestial room is also filled with elegant furnishings made by Italian artisans and sculpted off-white carpets.





A seemingly endless reflection from the mirrors in the sealing symbolizes rooms In those eternity. Latter-day rooms, Saint faithful participate in sacred ceremonies that join together families forever.



The Baroque-style bridal room is enhanced by the crystalline sconces and hand-painted chairs.

The primary stone used on the floors, stone base, walls and countertops throughout the temple is Perlato Svevo. It was quarried and carved in Italy by Saverna of Pietrasanta, Italy. Accent stone is used on the floor in the baptistry and the grand stair lobby. Patterns were inspired by Michelangelo's Piazza del Campidoglio and include the artist's intriguing oval design. Stones used in the floor patterns are cenia marble, quarried in Spain, and Mediterranean beige travertine, quarried in Italy. Sky lark marble, quarried in Brazil; emperado light marble, quarried in Turkey; and lapis lazuli are used as accents. In other areas of the temple, afyon sugar, Jerusalem gold marble and limestone, quarried in Turkey, and crema marfil marble, quarried in Spain are utilized. Carpeting is of brown, blue, taupe and green hues with an organic leaf pattern, inspired by the site's olive trees. Carpets in the celestial and sealing rooms are off-white with carvings reflected in the decorative painting and inspired by the Campidoglio.



The ceilings throughout the temple are adorned with simple, yet elegant, decorative painting in golds, blues, creams and greens. Some gold leafing is also featured. The designs were inspired by the olive tree, Roman acanthus leaves and the Campidoglio.





Art glass is featured in 19 doorways, one decorative partition and two lay lights. Though seen throughout the temple, it is most employed in the celestial room. Two basic designs were created for the glass: one of a symmetric, non-representational pattern, and the second the same olive tree pattern used in the exterior windows. A variety of hues were included in the glass pallet.

Artistic glass window

The walls are painted with Italian gypsum plaster, and decorative plaster is used in the instruction rooms, above the grand stair area and in the bride's room.



The temple has over 200 decorative lighting fixtures, most made of Murano glass from Venice, Italy, with designs ranging from simple organic textures to carved bowls. Nine chandeliers using Australian Swarovski Strass Crystal and 24k gold custom banding are featured in the instruction rooms. The celestial room chandelier contains rectangular prisms; the shape is repeated in the ceiling lay light.



The grand stair chandelier, inspired by Chihuly, incorporates the Venetian leaf pattern.

A combination of painted and stained woods are used throughout the temple. The primary wood used is sapele. Accent woods include pommele, anigre, burl veneer and cherry.

Doors are manufactured from sapele, pommele sapele and anigre. While some are painted, many doors feature an inlay pattern of two ovals, one on either end. The design is repeated in the door hardware.

The ceilings are constructed of painted hard-lid gypsum plaster and glass fiber-reinforced gypsum.

The murals seen in the instruction rooms are by Leon Parson from Idaho, USA. Artwork in the baptistry depicting the Savior's baptism is by Heather Theurer from Oregon, USA.

Visitors' Center

"Not all of the temples have a visitors' center, so this is a very special place. I hope that the members and the missionaries bring their families and their friends to teach the gospel of Christ right here in this visitors center." President Cordani of Piacenza



In the visitors' center, a full-size replica of the statue of the Christus, which is twice life-size, is accompanied by three-quarter-life-size sculptures of the original Twelve Apostles. These face the temple through full-length windows. The statues are replicas of sculptor Bertel Thorvaldsen's works displayed in the Church of Our Lady in Copenhagen Denmark. Special permission was received from the Lutheran Church to digitally scan and replicate the original figures. Carrara marble for the statues was taken from the same quarry in Tuscany as the marble for Michelangelo's David.



The statues are complimented by an original mural by Utah artist Joseph Brickey of olive trees in an Italian countryside that serves as a backdrop. Full-length windows offer a dramatic view of the statues in the rotunda setting and a similar view of the temple from inside the visitors' center.

Rome was the center of the western world when ancient Apostles Peter and Paul walked and taught here almost two thousand years ago. They testified of the Savior, Jesus Christ, and helped build His Church. Modern day Apostles also walked and taught in Rome as they prepared for the dedication of the Rome Italy Temple.



Apostles of Jesus Christ, no matter when they live or where they go, invite everyone to come to the Savior and find peace in Him.

Elder David A. Bednar and Elder Ronald A. Rasband, members of the Quorum of the Twelve Apostles of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, visited the prison where it is believed the ancient Apostles Peter and Paul were held captive after publicly sharing their witness of Jesus Christ.

Outside those prison doors, these modern-day Apostles publicly shared their witness of Jesus Christ with hundreds of thousands of people through the use of social media.

Elder Rasband said that he was honored to "witness to the world the same witness that Peter and Paul had of the Lord Jesus Christ." Elder Bednar testified, "He is the light and life of the world, and the only source of enduring, true joy."



The magnificent stained-glass mural in the visitors' center by Utah artist Tom Holdman includes over 120 references to the Savior's life and teachings.

Elder Rasband spoke of the Savior's parables depicted in the mural and invited his Facebook followers to see how many parables they could identify . . . and then seek for more learning and understanding of Christ's teachings in the New Testament. "We are always blessed when we turn to the words of Jesus Christ." He shared his special experience of seeing the mural in person. ". . . if I had missionaries in the Rome Italy Mission, I would surely want them to bring people who are interested in the Gospel to this visitors' center, to show them the beautiful cutout of the temple, and this diorama . . . and bear testimony in front of the *Christus* statue.

While in Rome, Elder Bednar and Elder Rasband had the opportunity to take many friends of other faiths into the temple to explain what members of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints believe.

"One might assume that sharing the same message day after day could become tedious," Elder Bednar said. "I can assure you, nothing could be further from the truth because we are talking about items of eternal significance. In fact, there is great power in repetition."

Elder Gary E. Stevenson, also a modern-day Apostle, added his witness of the Savior and the joy of eternal families in the temple visitors center.

The Villa in the Visitors' Center represents the importance of the home and family in the gospel of Jesus Christ. "The center is the perfect complement to the temple, said President Cordani. It is powerful. It reminds you for whom the temple is built. This is like a beacon, he added . . . It feels like we are entering a new phase in this

country. This light will not just shine on this square. It will spread throughout the country."

"Already the Church is growing in Italy", said Elder DeFeo, which he called a miracle. "Now the members of the Church here will be happy and proud to take their relatives and friends to this compound and show them the temple and visitors' center."



Relatively few Visitors' Centers have a model of their temple. This display gives visitors an opportunity to see the inside of the temple and learn how temples bless our lives.

Open House

After years of construction, Italy's first Latter-day Saint temple opened for a free public open house, beginning on Monday, January 28, 2019, and continuing every day except Sundays to Saturday, February 16, 2019.

"Now we will be even more visible, and we will have a stronger presence here," said Elder Massimo De Feo, a native Italian and General Authority Seventy who serves in the Europe Area Presidency "I see a bright future for the Church."

"That is a feeling all Church members can share", said Elder Ronald A. Rasband of the Quorum of the Twelve Apostles. "Now they have this exquisite, beautiful, magnificent temple, that will be a destination temple, not just for the Italian Saints but European Saints," he said. "Saints throughout the world are going to come to the Rome Italy Temple."

Church leaders met with the media to take them on tours of the temple on Monday, January 14, 2019. Tours for leaders of government, business, legal, interfaith and humanitarian organizations were held at the temple from Tuesday, January 15, through Tuesday, January 22, before the public open house began on Monday, January 28, and continuing through February 16th.

The first Italians to tour the new temple stopped just inside the front door and began to point and smile at something familiar, even though none had ever been inside a temple of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints before.

There in a rug in the foyer — and soon they found it throughout the temple in stained glass, in staircase railings and engraved in the floors and walls — was a unique oval motif created by Michelangelo nearly 500 years ago and familiar to most Romans today, one with added symbolism in a Latter-day Saint temple.

"This is from city hall, right?" local Italian politicians and journalists asked excitedly.

"It's very Roman," said Elder De Feo. "They were smiling because they recognized something that they could connect to immediately."


The design has meaning beyond the architect's desire to tie the temple to Rome's history, art and architecture.

"I think it's a very nice gesture and gift to the city of Rome to place that symbol in the temple," said Marcello De Vito, president of the Rome City Council. "We are honored to have them bring that symbol into the temple. During the tour of the temple, we learned the oval is a symbol of eternity in your religion. The temple combines this symbol of your religion with a symbol of the city of Rome."

In the 16th century, Pope Paul III commissioned Michelangelo to redesign Capitoline Hill, one of the Seven Hills of Rome. Anciently, the hill was dedicated to the god Saturn. Later, it was the site of the temple of Jupiter. By the 1530s, it was in disrepair. The pope hoped the artist could recapture Rome's glory.

Michelangelo designed three new buildings, including one used today as Rome's city hall. The other two now are famous as the Capitoline museums. The sculptor's plans called for a plaza in the center of the buildings decorated with a paved oval surrounding an interlaced 12-point star. All who visit the hill remember the unique Piazza del

Campidoglio.

Giovanni Claudo, president of the Third Roman Municipality, said the church's decision to reimagine the Roman symbol for the temple was itself a symbol of its effort to connect the temple to the community.

"Living together is a characteristic of our city, and that is confirmed by the presence of this building in the city. We are very glad to welcome this cultural center in Rome. Our city is well known for its Renaissance and baroque styles. This is a very nice modern architecture which will add to our city," said President Marcello De Vito of the Rome City Council.

"As a citizen of this municipal entity I'm really proud I'm able to participate in this inauguration. I bring the mayor's greetings for this great building that makes our city more beautiful. It's a happy day for all those who believe that different people and religions can live together, who believe being able to communicate is the best way to keep peace among different religions, races and peoples," said President Giovanni Caudo, president of the Rome Municipality.

"When they saw [the oval] in the temple they immediately connected to it, because as Romans they immediately felt this is something that we know," Elder De Feo said. "That was a door opening to them as I explained the significance and the meaning. When they saw that we give value to and honor local authors, and we portrayed Michelangelo, for example, who is the greatest sculptor, they were very proud, and they got excited."

The Rome Italy Temple was dedicated on Sunday, March 10, 2019 by President Russell M Nelson. Every member of the First Presidency and the Quorum of the Twelve Apostles participated in the dedication.

Rome Italy Temple, Open House, January - February 2019:

Sister Missionary Training January 11



In January 2019, final preparations began for the Rome Italy Temple Open House and Dedication. On Thursday January 10, 2019, the 28 sister missionaries serving in Sicily, Sardegna and Puglia (Napoli) travelled to the villa in preparation for training for the open house.

On January 11, all of the sisters in the Italy Rome Mission came to Rome for training with Mark Robbins from the Temple Department at church headquarters in Salt Lake City and Elder Alessandro Dini Ciacci, of the Seventy who is the Area Seventy assigned for Italy. The sisters were privileged to receive instruction from them and President and Sister Pickerd. This may have been the first or one of the first formal meetings held in the chapel. We then toured the visitors' center and had lunch in the patron's center.





Tom and Gayle Holdman, of Holdman Studios, also came to explain their work "Come Follow Me", the stained-glass piece in the entry to the Visitors' Center. The sister missionaries each practiced the Open House Introductory script they had learned and how to use the audio-visual equipment. The sisters returned to their proselyting areas Friday afternoon.

Contractor Tour January 12

The contractor tour was held Saturday, January 12 and the sisters had an opportunity to present live. All of the contractors who worked on some portion of the Temple site construction project were invited along with their family and friends. 1,128 attended, and we were stretched to capacity. They seemingly all arrived within a two hour, 10 a.m. to noon window, in order to be home in time for pranzo! We managed the crush of people as well as we could. We were grateful for this preparatory day for the Open House when the attendees would be on the temple site for the very first time and were not as familiar with the Temple site as the contractors.



Media Day was January 14 and the sister missionaries did not attend as the media was hosted by the General Authorities and members of the Church's Public Affairs Department. There was very favorable publicity by the major International and Italian new agencies in print, TV and online. A formal press conference was held, Elders David A. Bednar, Ronald A. Rasband and Elder Massimo De Feo answered questions from the media. We were grateful that the stories were accurate and positive.

Special Guests January 15

The sister missionaries served during the special guests open house from January 15 to January 26. They were privileged to interact with a number of the Quorum of the Twelve Apostles including Elder David A. Bednar, Elder Ronald A. Rasband, Elder Gary E. Stevenson and their wives. In addition, a number of General Authorities participated including, Elder Paul V. Johnson, Elder Gary B. Sabin and Elder Massimo De Feo all from the Europe Area Presidency, Elder Larry Y. Wilson and their wives and Elder Jack Gerard.



General Public Open House January 28-February 23

The open house for the general public was held from January 28 to February 16. An additional Saturday of the open house was held February 23. Every sister in the mission was allowed to serve. Each week, a different group of sister missionaries would leave their proselyting area, come to Rome and stay at the Villa.

Monday through Saturday, we would travel with the mission vans each day for the temple grounds. We would leave the Villa at about 8:15 in the morning and return about 9:15 at night. Sister Kathleen and Elder Kevin Feil, a Missionary Leadership Service couple serving in Perugia, prepared meals to feed the sister missionaries as they stayed at the Villa. Elder and Sister Feil stayed at the Villa and were a blessing for all.




Throughout the open house, the sister missionaries were assigned to work in the Chapel, to welcome the visitors and show them a brief video, or to work in the Visitors' Center, where they could answer questions. Due to the travel costs and time, the sisters in Rome were able to serve more often.

The Public Open House concluded Saturday, the 23rd of February. That day, we were blessed with over 1,800 guests entering the temple, 95% of which were Italian, the majority of which were nonmembers! At the conclusion of the evening, Elder DiniCiacci entered the Visitors' Center and saw it still packed with Italians everywhere.

He became emotional as the Local Chairman of the Temple Committee seeing the fulfillment of the prayers, hope and hard work of the Committee.


For the period of the Open House which began on January 13 with the construction crew, there were over 50,000 people who toured the temple, leaving over 3,000 comments.

Open House Experiences

All who entered the temple were impressed and pleased to have it part of their country on Italian soil. In general, the open house visitors seemed to be of a higher economic, education and social status than the missionaries would normally encounter through street, bus or park contacting. The neighbors were particularly impressed.

During the open house, many wonderful experiences occurred.

- One 17-year-old sister, Nicole Sorrentino, who had been listening to the discussions in Castellammare, decided on the Temple Piazza that she would be baptized.
- One man went into the family history center and discovered in a few minutes that his family tree extended back into the 1600's.
- The Malta Branch came and was led through the temple by President Pickerd. He asked Joe and Joyce Vella, recent Maltese converts, to stand in front of the mirrors in the sealing room and talked to them about their future eternal marriage. The Vellas were sealed in the Rome Italy Temple in January 2020.
- A young man admitted he was an inactive living in Italy from South America. Sister Pickerd connected him with a senior couple, Elder and Sister Whiting, and he attended church the following Sunday.
- A lot of people came out of the celestial room emotionally touched with tears in their eyes. They felt something but were not sure what they had felt.
- One sweet woman came 3 times. She felt the spirit each time in the celestial room. She said she was too old to change.
- A part member family met President Pickerd on the Temple Piazza and were taught by the sister missionaries in the Milano mission.



The Open House truly was a miraculous experience as we greeted approximately 55,000 guests. The temple represents a tangible sign that the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints has been established in Italy as an ongoing part of the restoration. The temple is a great blessing for all within the temple district as it will provide the sacred ordinances and covenants necessary to find true joy in a confused world.

Zone Conferences during the Open House

During the open house, we held three, shortened and combined zone conferences at the temple on Sunday night. Each zone travelled to Rome after attending Sunday meetings in their assigned proselyting areas.

January 27 - Puglia, Palermo, Catania Sorelle

February 3 - Napoli, Sardegna, Roma West

February 10 - Rome East, Le Montagne, Catania Anziani


Sister Pickerd talked about the importance of the temple and staying true to our covenants for our entire lives. President Pickerd talked about Doctrine and Covenants 109 and gave the missionaries some quiet time to reflect on the temple grounds. The assistants talked about the four fundamentals of missionary work using cranes as their example. Jesus Christ was their most important fundamental. Zone leaders and sister training leaders were given some time to talk to their zones. We took photos of each zone in front of the Christus in the Visitors' Center.



Early the following Monday morning, the missionaries toured the temple itself. Sister Pickerd was the guide for the sisters and President Pickerd guided the Elders. They both spent considerable time in the sealing and celestial rooms inviting the missionaries to commit to a temple marriage.
















Président and Sister Donald E. Smith

Here is an entry from my personal journal that goes with the photo of role playing. After my mission I read my journal and then wrote a 5-page summary of my mission to update my personal history. This is a little long but there are 3 specific beautiful experiences I had in doing role plays with the sisters. Perhaps you may want to share something I wrote. The sisters will remember and relate to those special moments roleplaying.

"When a new sister arrived, within their first 2 weeks I did an informal orientation with them. I used my notes from our trainers from Salt Lake that we received the week the VC opened to visitors. When the VC was newly opened, and all the sisters were new, we role played daily. Any time things were slow, I did role plays. Whenever there were transfers and we had a sister struggling with language or teaching confidence I would focus on that companion pair. When the new Mission President, President Smith arrived he challenged us to a higher level of personal engagement with our visitors (encouraged us to not talk about "statues" but to talk about principles and what they mean to us personally). I began a higher level of role playing, identifying with the sisters the principles that we can teach at each display and what our personal experiences are with each of the principles. Wow did I have some beautiful experiences. I started recording in my notebook principles that the sisters taught in roleplays and compiled them for everyone's use. I had so many spiritual moments where those sisters really got in touch with their personal experiences with applying the principles of the gospel. We shed many tears doing role plays. Notable was Sister Madsen role playing teaching the principle of repentance as she shared struggles early in her mission and how she, through the help of a previous companion, was now "totally in". One day I did a role play with Sisters Waddell and Deschine at the temple model. Sister Deschine had struggled with language at the beginning of her mission. She eloquently expressed such a beautiful personal appreciation for the temple we were all three in tears. On another occasion I had a cool experience with Sorella Brooks doing a role play at the same temple model. She and Sister Williams beautifully explained everything in the temple but failed to express their feelings about the temple. I made them aware of how powerful sharing our experiences can be, and I shared a personal experience and asked her to share her feelings. She really connected with some strong feelings, she teared up as she told me of her love for the temple and she went away convinced that she needed to share these experiences with visitors as they seek to invite the spirit. A day later she wrote us a very sweet note and left it in our locker".

Secret Santa service/gift exchange worked together to make it indeed "the most wonderful time of the year".




Sorella Chloé Worthen






